CAPTAINS REPORT

As we get into winter be prepared for some changes to the way we do things on the golf course. Although winter doesn't affect us as much as the southern states, it does so

marginally. The winds are colder along with the overall cooler temperatures and of course rain, and the morning dew takes longer to disappear and generally on those days where these conditions are prevalent, there is less run on the course .So be prepared with warmer clothing and wet weather protection, spare gloves, choose your clubs wisely and get on with it for the few months that we have these conditions.

As you would know, I introduced "READY GOLF" a couple of years ago as soon as I knew that it had been officially recognised by the R&A. They have now released some further information on its success internationally by using a "poster" from their original release. It's worth including their recent publication.

"Ready golf" is not appropriate in match play due to the strategy involved between opponents and the need to have a set method for determining which player plays first. However, in stroke play formats it is only the act of agreeing to play out of turn to give one of the players an advantage that is prohibited. On this basis, it is permissible for administrators to encourage "ready golf" in stroke play, and there is strong evidence to suggest that playing "ready golf" does improve the pace of play. For example, in a survey of Australian golf clubs conducted by Golf Australia, 94% of clubs that had promoted "ready golf" to their members enjoyed some degree of success in improving pace of play, with 25% stating that they had achieved 'satisfying success'.


When "ready golf" is being encouraged, players have to act sensibly to ensure that playing out of turn does not endanger other players.

"Ready golf" should not be confused with being ready to play, which is covered in the Player Behaviour section of this Manual.

The term "ready golf" has been adopted by many as a catch-all phrase for a number of actions that separately and collectively can improve pace of play. There is no official definition of the term, but examples of "ready golf" in action are:

- · Hitting a shot when safe to do so if a player farther away faces a challenging shot and is taking time to assess their options
- · Shorter hitters playing first from the tee or fairway if longer hitters have to wait
- · Hitting a tee shot if the person with the honour is delayed in being ready to play
- · Hitting a shot before helping someone to look for a lost ball
- · Putting out even if it means standing close to someone else's line
- · Hitting a shot if a person who has just played from a greenside bunker is still farthest from the hole but is delayed due to raking the bunker
- · When a player's ball has gone over the back of a green, any player closer to the hole but chipping from the front of the green should play while the other player is having to walk to their ball and assess their shot

· Marking scores upon immediate arrival at the next tee, except that the first player to tee off marks their card immediately after teeing off



May I add that on average by adopting READY GOLF you have brought the average time spent during a round to approximately 4 hours. Very acceptable! As long as we all are mindful of this way of playing the game, the already reduced time will get even better.

Now an apology. The recent Wide Bay Open played over two days, the 15th & 16th June was not a resounding success! This event rotates over the four major clubs in the "Golf, Wide Bay" Association; Hervey Bay, Maryborough, Bargara & Bundaberg, so it happens here every four years. From information given to me, I was to expect a lot of player support from other clubs so I had to be mindful of ensuring we had room for these visiting players in the field. Hence the "Nomination" sheet process. The closing date for the event was set at Wednesday prior to the event (not by me). That would then allow us to gauge our numbers and open up the time sheet as per usual. Obviously, the

numbers were nowhere near expectations, in fact nearly a hundred players short of our usual Saturday field!

I was informed that the entry fee of \$25 per day (\$50 for the two days) was the usual fee charged for the event. I added the Burger lunch and Pin shots to at least give more value in the fee. We also chose the Trophies to be of a higher value than suggested to enhance the experience in keeping with the nature of this Association Championship status.

Naturally, the event did not turn out as hoped for the reasons outlined above and without doubt, I would have handled things differently knowing what I do now! I apologise to our members if, for whatever reason you elected not to play over the weekend or were unhappy with the way it was handled. Incidentally, some Golf Wide Bay officials present commented afterwards that it was getting harder to attract players from other clubs as there is a trend for them not to travel as much as they did a few years ago. A lesson learnt for whoever organises the event in 2023!

Moving on, and a sad note to inform you of the passing of a long standing and well-liked member of our club. Paul "Doc" Burrows passed away on Saturday 15th June after a couple of years battling cancer. Whilst a member, Doc was an active organising member of the Thursday Business Group, a financial contributor to our Juniors and more recently spent nearly three years on my Match Committee. Sadly missed by his family and friends.

Also, the Club Foursomes Championship sponsored by Daly Classic Homes, was played on Sunday as well. Thanks to Peter Daly once again. Champions were Tam Leciej & Brett Ritchie with runners up Masifili Lyons. Nett winners Gail & John Sheehan, runners up Wendy & Allan Taylor. Congratulations to our winners and thanks to everybody that supported the event on a rather chilly but fun day!

The Ian Glaister Flooring Mixed Canadian Foursomes knockout opening (Qualifying) round kicks off on this Sunday 30th June as well. The top 16 pairs qualify. GREENS AND FORWARD PLANNING REPORT

Dear Members, please find the June update from the Greens and Forward Planning Committee.

Much planning work has been undertaken in preparation of the drainage for the 4th hole. Members may notice the pegs and line marking on the ground. The survey marks have been put in place to confirm the proposed infrastructure location and ensure the design can work. Works will commence when we have the costs finalised and have fully resolved the discharge outlet location.

As previously noted last month the works will comprise of the following;

- 1. Installation of an underground pipe system with grated surface inlet pits to drain surface and subsurface stormwater to a discharge point downstream of the course. Approx 350 metres of pipe along the left-hand side of the fairway;
- 2. Installation of approximately 700 metres of lateral subsurface drainage (agricultural lines) to drain saturated soil to the underground pipe system;
- 3. Installation of "end of line" flushing points to the subsurface drainage for future maintenance access;
- 4. Construction of an overland collection swale along the left-hand side of the fairway over the pipes system and then crossing the front of the 4th green to join the existing overland flow channel:
- 5. Lowering of the pipe culvert crossing at the right-hand side of the 4th green;
- 6. Reshaping and cleaning out of the open drain from the right hand side of the 4th green to the Hythe Street road reserve at the northern boundary of the golf course property.

The bunker drainage on the 8th is progressing. Once again members are expected to not be impacted as these works progress however, there may, at times be bunkers out of play during the upgrade period. The greens staff will be carrying out the project to keep costs down. This method of rectification is working successfully on other bunkers on the course and is proving to be effective.

The irrigation valves replacements are well on track now with under the direction of the Greens Superintendent with nearly 2 zones of the 3 zones complete. Members may notice this occurring on the course and should be wary of the work areas when playing.

Expansion of the turf nursery at the 14th tee and progressive cutting down of the rough around the 6th, 10th and 17th greens is continuing over the coming months.

Expansion of the Ladies tee block on the 2nd hole is now in place and will settle over the coming months. It is envisaged that the tee block expansion will offer more approach options for the hole and allow a wider variety of pin placements.

Other projects progressing to budget consideration include;

- · Progressive installation of cart paths throughout the course;
- · Additional irrigation pump for the reuse water supply;
- · Reserve irrigation pump for the water distribution system;
- · Expansion of the 4th green;
- · Installation of steps to some tees for improved access.

Not much more to report this month as the course is continuing be worked on daily by the Green Staff to address weeds, root invasion and general garden maintenance.

Congratulations to Lachlan Wood for his win in the Matchplay final. Gary Oborn and I had the pleasure of playing a competition round with Adam Hall and Lachlan on the day. Both players were off the same handicap so no one had a shot advantage. Lachlan got to a four hole lead with four to play. However, Adam pegged it back to be one down with one to play. It was thriller in the end with many clutch putts coming out as the day progressed. The result was not decided until the last putt on the 18th hole.

Alternatively, you can email the club through the secretary or reception addresses. The committee is more than happy to receive your comments and review them constructively for consideration.

As always, I look forward to receiving your written suggestions put forward on how we can further improve the course and keep our club progressing.

Members.

We have had a total of 57mm of rain for the month of June, which has made the course damp in areas as we don't have the heat from sun to dry it out. Can I please ask to follow cart signs and daily restrictions when in place as this will help keep damage from carts to a minimum.

We recently completed the bunker drainage on 8, we also reshaped one of the bunkers to give you better playing condition and for maintenance for us. It will take a little bit to firm up due to the new sand in them so please be patient.

We have 2 new fountains being installed at our irrigation dam to help keep algae at bay and improve the water quality.

Shortly I will be marking out the pin positions for the Legends Pro Am so you may get a few pins in different spots, this is so we can keep the area around the Pro Am pins neat.

The small social tee on 2 has been lengthened and has been turfed with a new type of couch TifTuf, which is meant to have fast recovery and be more shade tolerant. This tee when opened will be used for when you have a back pin. It opens up the green and should take those bunkers more out of play.

That's it for me enjoy your course.

VETERANS REPORT

At our recent meeting there was much discussion about what constitutes "a garden bed" and whether a free drop is available. This also led onto a discussion about GUR areas. I informed the meeting that there are no designated garden beds on our course and no free drop unless the area has a GUR sign. All GUR areas are discretionary unless signed compulsory. I have confirmed with captain Gary that this is correct.

The other controversial topic involved movable/immovable obstructions. There are no movable obstructions on our course. All obstructions (wooden stakes with or without ropes, cart direction signs, distance markers and white hoops) are immovable obstructions and only when they interfere with stance or swing can a free drop be taken.

We are once again applying for a Saturday date in September for a sausage sizzle at Bunnings.

It is also our intention to donate a seat at the 16th teeing area adjacent to the Blue Tee. Actual location to be discussed with ground staff.

A friendly reminder, that during wet weather, when instructed to keep carts clear of certain fairways it is important to comply. These rules are not brought in very often but when they are it is done for the protection of the course. There have been some members reported for not obeying and will be referred to the committee for action.
